

A Level Geography



Subject Overview

Geography is highly valued by universities as an A level choice. The Russell Group 2011 report names Geography as one of the eight facilitating subjects. This is a subject most likely to be required or preferred for entry to degree courses and choosing facilitating subjects will keep more options open to you at university.

Your A level Geography course will cover both the physical and human environments and the complex interaction of processes that shape our world. It will also show the applied side of the subject- how human intervention affects the environment and how people adapt and mitigate the effects of processes on their environment. By the time you get to your exams, you will be able to show your understanding of a range of opinions and be able to illustrate your answers with case studies from local, national and international examples.
